Sarah Albisser

Sarah Albisser's background as a contemporary dancer and choreographer has had a powerful influence on both her life and her art. She is fascinated by movement and self-expression, which over the past decade has resulted in a collection of striking black-and-white portraits of female faces and more recently her series of divers

Devoting herself to a unifying theme for so many years has enabled her to explore and experiment with various techniques and materials, including pens, acrylics, perspex, and thread. Her art captures form, feeling, and evanescent moments in time, and she often leaves a section of the canvas unfinished for the viewer to complete with their interpretations and imaginations.

Sarah has had exhibitions of her work in New Zealand, Australia, Switzerland, and Los Angeles. Her artworks are now held in private collections around the world.

Esther Bunning

Esther Bunning has a style that is both instantly recognisable and difficult to pin down. Drawn to quiet beauty and resplendent light, she weaves elements in a dreamy pastiche. Her creative vision, coupled with a gleeful willingness to explore idiosyncratic gear has evolved to include the intricacies, depth, and layers of details in a landscape, details otherwise perhaps unseen. Bunnings work has an organic, dreamlike twist that draws the viewer in to a blurred reality, and her work touches on nostalgia and is reflective of a past era, with a unique and contemporary eye.

Her Aotearoa landscape silk and linen work is an exploration and organic unravelling of the physical and invisible threads that bind us to the land. The process and the images reflect the continuous shift of New Zealand terrain, and the movement of earth of under our feet. This work is represented as 'silk' stories, and as limited edition artworks.

Minu Freitag is a New Zealand-based artist and writer. Trained as an architect and multimedia producer, she has worn many hats in the creative industries but found her creative home as a toymaker, illustrator, and writer. Minu Freitag now lives and works as an independent artist and maker.

Minu's often anthropomorphic characters and scenes seem to emerge from forgotten tales of lonely wanderers, fantastical creatures, and woodland spirits. Her creations are caught in a juxtaposition between light and dark, melancholy and hope—shifting their shapes, revealing inner worlds, or living in symbioses with other beings.



Jennifer Halli

Peripatetic in nature, Jennifer was raised in the wilds of South Carolina and found home in Ngāmotu New Plymouth by way of Kāwhia, Massachusetts, Missouri, New Jersey, North Carolina, Montana, Melbourne, Kardella, Wellington, Feilding, Tennessee, South Carolina, Colorado, and Pennsylvania.

She participates in international exhibitions and residencies and earned her MFA from the University of Massachusetts|Dartmouth in 2019 as a Distinguished Art Fellow. In April 2023, Jennifer won the New Zealand Painting and Printmaking Awards Main Prize for Printmaking. Jennifer runs MIGHT COULD, an experimental art project space in central Ngāmotu New Plymouth.

Wendy Hannah

Wendy Hannah: Ngati Awa - Te Arawa- English Descent

Wendy is a sculptural colour and light artist. Colour and light are her forte which she developed as scientific experiments over three decades. She has a vast knowledge of paint and surface.

The overriding theme of Wendy's work is diversity and sustainability. Constructed from reused plastic these works are cycles of life, how light transforms space over time.

Recently she has been playing with reflective and refractive light. Using recycled coloured acrylic and dichroic surface where her works seem extremely delicate and light in a way that seems not to be of this world.

I am using light in the same way you would use glazing techniques in traditional painting. Overlaying light through the panels of the form creating "Beacons of Light" which truly captivate.

Of dual Maori (Ngati Marukukere) and Pakeha (English/Scottish/French) descent, her work is rich in symbolism relating to her multicultural identity, the quest for a sense of self, the despair of displacement, the joy of connecting with her whakapapa, the love of her home. Her work is often playful whilst telling a story of ancestral connections, spiritual connectedness, courage, kindness, and bravery along the way.

Her abstract work focuses on contrasts. Contrast in shapes, lines, sizes, values, texture, direction, and colour, as much contrast as possible to keep the viewer entertained. The process is mainly about building layers in the work. "I don't plan apart from selecting colours to start with. It's more about working in stages and layers. "
